Do you bank at a credit union? Not for long

Local credit unions protest government ban on calling their financial services 'banking'

ank is soon going to be a four-letter word for credit unions in E Canada.

On June 30, the Office S of the Superintendent of **Financial Institutions** (OSFI) issued an advisory stating that its interpretation of the Bank Act restricted the use of the words bank, banker and banking by "all non-bank financial service providers, including both federally

regulated trust and loan companies and provincially regulated institutions ... also ... unregulated financial service providers."

"We don't write the Bank Act: we enforce it." said Sylviane Desparois, manager of public affairs for OSFI, an independent government agency reporting to the ministry of finance.

"We observed that nonbank financial services providers were using the word more, especially in their logos, marketing and websites, which is why we decided to issue this advisory ... the rationale is

from the Bank Act, to avoid confusion for consumers."

By the end of this year, all non-hanks will have to remove the word from their websites and other electronic mediums. By June 30, 2018, they have to remove it from any printed material, and by June 30, 2019, it has to be removed from any physical signage.

"Most credit unions did protest (and) tried to get the Ministry of Finance to push back on that. It obviously did not work," said David Heowig, member service representative at Meridian Credit Union's Binbrook branch. "It's a bit of an obstacle, because we have to change the terminology." Steve Bolton, president and CEO of Libro Credit Union, said that when the advisory came out, "we were dumbfounded ... to find out a word we've been using, a word the public believes is a verb, is a word

we can no longer use."

Bolton said that credit unions "have no ambition to be a bank. We're very different; we have a very different organizational structure," which is why he's not opposed to a limit on credit unions using the word bank as a noun.

However, he added,

"Banking is what we do. We have deposit accounts, checking accounts, banking products. That's the business we're in. To say now that we can't use the word that Canadians use day in and day out to describe a set of activities is just silly."

Flamborough-Glanbrook MP David Sweet agrees. "To me, banking has become a generic, colloquial word now. If I want to write somebody a cheque, I'm banking. If I want to deposit some money, I'm banking. It has nothing to do with the differentiation with credit unions or charter banks."

Sweet said that his office hasn't been getting calls from constituents about this issue.

"I think it's because it's summer and it hasn't really hit them," he said.

Sweet thinks that as more people become aware of what's going on, "everybody's going to say this is bureaucratic mumbo-jumbo that's gone amuck again."

Bolton estimates the "mumbo-jumbo" will cost Libro about half a million dollars to comply.

"I think it's a waste of time, energy and money," he said.

As for the idea that the change will help limit confusion among consumers, Bolton minced no words.

"I don't buy that," he said. "I haven't heard one instance of someone being confused. I find that argument really light.
