# **Arsonist torched Trinity Baptist Church**

'ISIS' spray-painted on outer rear wall of house of worship

Wednesday's fire at Trinity Baptist Church was the work of an arsonist, according to Ontario's Office of the Fire Marshal.

Despite the fact 'ISIS' had been spraypainted on an outer wall of the church, Halton police aren't saying whether they are treating it as a hate crime.

When Trinity Baptist Church Pastor Carl Muller arrived on scene at 2 a.m. Wednesday to find the place of worship engulfed in flames, he was "awestruck."

But Muller wasn't talking about the fire itself, which engulfed the 1890s church located on 4372 Appleby Line, just south of No. 2 Sideroad.

"I was awestruck by the bravery of these firefighters," he told the Post. "I've never seen something like that before. I'm very thankful for the work they do."

While the church's roof was gutted, its charred frame is all that remains, firefighters managed to keep the blaze from spreading to the church's adjacent newer building, which opened in 2004 and is where weekly services are held.

"There's some water and smoke damage, but we're told it's still in good shape. So, we're very thankful to the fire department," said Muller.



### Five injured in pharmacy robbery

Five people were injured Monday (May 29) night in an Oakville pharmacy robbery where the culprits used a noxious spray similar to pepper spray.

Halton police Duty Insp. Kevin Maher said three of the victims were taken to hospital with non-life threatening injuries following the heist at the Guardian drug store, located at Trafalgar Road and White Oaks Boulevard.

At 8 p.m., two males armed with handguns entered the 1235 Trafalgar Rd. pharmacy demanding cash. Several customers inside the pharmacy were also sprayed with a noxious substance.

After stealing an undetermined amount of money and narcotics, the culprits fled to a waiting car operated by a female driver.

Several witnesses were treated by paramedics at the scene and some were taken to hospital for treatment and evaluation.
