SCHOOL BOARD WILL SUPPORT AN INFLUX OF STUDENTS WITH AUTISM

DURHAM - The Durham District School Board is expecting an influx of students with autism over the next two years, and a new report says the board is growing its supports.

About 350 additional students with autism are expected over the next two years, about double the normal amount.

"That's due to growth in enrollment in the board, increasing diagnosis as well as the impact of the Ontario autism program," says DDSB Superintendent Andrea McAuley.

On July 27, the province an-

RAIDERS **STEAL BACK MAYOR'S CUP**

RIVALRY WEEK COMPETITION WITH HENRY STREET HAWKS NOW TIED 5-5

The Anderson Raiders have reclaimed the Mayor's Cup and tied the annual Rivalry Week competition with the Henry Street Hawks.

The two Whitby schools went toe-to-toe for the tenth time, amidst plenty of support from students on both sides.

The Raiders ended up sweeping this year's event, winning 4-3 in overtime in boys' hockey at the Tribute

Community Centre, 55-48 in senior boys' basketball at Henry Street High School, and 3-0 in girls' volleyball at Anderson Collegiate Vocational Institute. For good measure, Anderson also prevailed in a girls' hockey exhibition, 1-0.

The Hawks had taken a 5-4 overall lead by winning last year's event. but it's all tied at 5-5 now heading into 2020.
