Better by the dozen as Kings' winning streak continues

Victories over Guelph and Cambridge give Elmira 12 straight wins, place atop of the conference standings

MAKE IT AN EVEN dozen for the Elmira Sugar Kings, who pulled off another pair of wins over the weekend to bring their winning streak to 12 straight.

They sit at the top of the Midwestern Conference with a 17-3-1 record, four points above second-place Listowel

The Kings defeated the Guelph Hurricanes 4-3 on Nov. 5 at the Sleeman Centre. They returned home the following night to earn a 3-1 victory over the Cambridge Winter Hawks.

Despite watching his players find ways to finish both games on the right side, head coach Ty Canal notes it wasn't their best weekend.

"We didn't get off to the start we wanted. We got down a goal. That hasn't happened a lot to us this year where we're down after the first, so that's nice to see our guys were able to battle back through that. I'd say it definitely wasn't the 60-minute game that we were hoping to play," Canal said.

In Guelph, the Sugar Kings fell behind 2-0 in the first period, the first time they had trailed behind another team since Oct. 11. Hurricane goals were scored by Alex Ritchie and Chris Poletek, assisted by Anthony Mota, Lyam Cripps, Cameron Stokes and Harlen

Elmira's Ty Biles put his team on the score board with less than a minute of play left in the first period. Helpers were Ethan Skinner and Jake Brown.

Guelph increased to a 3-1 lead in the second as Stokes scored, assisted by Poletek and Mitchell Morrison. The Kings took advantage of a power play opportunity as Quinten Bruce (Skinner) scored to head into the final frame still behind by a goal.

Andrew McIntyre evened the score with a power play marker of his own early in the third, helped by Zack Cameron and Klayton Hoelscher. And with less than two minutes on the clock, Kyle Soper put the puck in Guelph's net shorthanded. Jonathan Reinhart and Skinner assisted.

"It wasn't a consistent game by us, by any means. There were good things out of the weekend but there were still some areas that we were playing better at before and we'll look to improve on obviously," Canal said.

Do you think it is safe to drink water out of a beaver pond?"

The universal answer would be: "I don't know. Why don't we ask Captain Obvious."

This is followed by several har-har-hars and one or two hardy-har-hars - neither of which is good.

In order to get respect from fellow hunters, you need to offer more.

Seasoned deer hunters approach it like this.

First, they place both bare hands over the tracks to feel for residual heat. Then, they smell the track. Lastly, they place an ear



to the ground over the track and listen for a few seconds and, should some nimrod make a sound, they shush them right up. Once the hunter rises, he or she then tests the wind by wetting an index finger and holding it high.

Then the hunter holds court.

"That track was created by a big buck," the hunter begins. This is critical because no one cares about tiny fawns.

"I know the tracks look extremely tiny and fawnlike," the hunter will continue, "but that just goes to show you how crafty a 324-pound buck can be. Unless I am totally wrong, I'd say that buck is a 15-pointer, and judging by the fact that the left track is microscopically deeper

than the right, I'd say the buck broke off the top half-

inch of its right brow tine fighting with an arthritic 13-pointer that prefers beech nuts over acorns...."

Then, the hunter will inhale deeply and add, "That fight took place at six minutes before noon three days ago in the southwest corner of the swamp near a maple tree that's 47 years old..."

This kind of detailed analysis garners respect. As a longtime hunter, I know this. That's why I was able to correctly analyze a photo I had on my trail camera that shows three blurs running by at full tilt.

I showed it to a friend and went on to explain I had set up my trail camera there precisely because I knew this was a trail where irresponsible deer, after a night of eating fermented apples, came to drag race. I further noted I had

found the deer I wished

to harvest and pointed to the last blur in the photo. I said the first deer was far too fast to be a mature heavy bodied animal. The second deer, I suggested, was the same age as the first deer but was slower because of the poor aerodynamic qualities of its antlers.

"So you are saying that you are going to shoot the slowest of the three because mature, big antlered deer are usually slower off the line," he said.

I nodded and added, "You see, that's why trail cameras are great. They show you what deer are doing when you are not there."

"Thanks Captain Obvious," he said.

By the way, the answer to the question posed earlier is never drink stagnant water out of an active beaver pond.

The Jacks are third in the league behind Ayr and Paris.


Wellesley took the lead early as defenseman Lucas Spence put one past Woodstock goalie North Davies. Sean McEwan and Jake Wilkinson assisted.



THE ELMIRA DISTRICT **SECONDARY** School alpine ski team is prepping to hit the slopes next week for their first Waterloo County Secondary School Athletic Association meet.

The team will be heading to Beaver Valley Ski Club on Feb. 9 to compete against other schools in the region, trying for the fastest time down the hill.

The recent weather patterns put a damper on their practice meet plans earlier this month, but one of the team's coaches, Chris Finnie, says there is still time to prepare for the competition.

"We had one training day at Beaver Valley last month, and we were supposed to have a second mini-meet where the skiers could get their times, but it didn't count. It was supposed to be a timed race so they could see where they ranked, but unfortunately, we couldn't make it up there," he said. "However, we do have a day, on Feb. 7,

when we are going to Chicopee and there is going to be a race set up there." Finnie says the team is

competitive compared to other schools despite one less day of practice.

"About half were on the team last year, and then we have the other half who are trying it out for the first time," he said. "We have two students who could really compete. Last year. we had one of our female racers do really well at the mini-meet last year, and had some difficulties after that, but this year should be good."

The alpine ski teams are divided into two groups: amateur skiers who just have fun on the slopes, and more experienced skiers who ski in clubs outside of school. This year's EDSS team has only amateur skiers, but Finnie says that doesn't matter.
