

## An Upclose view of the Highgate Fair

Cloudy weather didn't stop people from coming out to the 165th edition of the local fair Saturday

He was one of the hundreds on hand for the day-long community event. This year's winning float was from Ryckman Farms in Duart. Eleven year-old Jamie Ryckman made a softball team in Springfield this year. He became good friend with his catcher, Kyle Eyndhoven of Stratfordville. But in June, Eyndhoven was diagnosed with leukemia. He's scheduled for surgery in December. The Ryckman's are actively supporting the family and made their float a tribute to the young catcher - with everyone wearing orange shirts and selling orange bracelets to raise money to help support the family during treatment. Kyle's mom, Tanya, says the Ryckman's have become like a second family. The winner of best float in the parade receives a cheque - that money was given to Kyle and his family during the opening ceremonies. Long-time fair volunteer Carolyn Gentes was also honoured. Gentes died in March at the age of 71. She had been involved in all aspects of the fair over the year including serving as its president. Volunteers at the event say her expertise was missed while they were planning and setting up for this year's event. Gentes' husband, Maurice, accepted a plaque in her honour.
